Texts:

I. COURSE GOALS: In this course students will develop effective communication skills in Korean appropriate to this stage of language study and expand their knowledge of language and culture.

II. GENERAL EXPECTATIONS:

- Students are expected to arrive on time and to remain in class for the entire class period. There are no excused absences. For each absence in excess of three, one point will be deducted from the student's final grade average.

- If for some reason you find it necessary to arrive late or to miss a class, you are responsible for all information, assignments, and announcements made during the class meeting.
- You are expected to study and practice at home as a part of your daily preparation.
- No late homework will be accepted.
- No make-up test or assignments will be given. A grade of “0” will be assigned for all work not turned in or any test not taken. Emergencies will be handled on the individual bases.
- Turn off all cell phones, beepers, pagers and any other potentially disruptive noise makers before arriving to class.

III. GENERAL POLICIES:

1. Academic Integrity:

Every KSU student is responsible for upholding the provisions of the Student Code of Conduct, as published in the Undergraduate and Graduate Catalogs. The Department of Foreign Languages at Kennesaw State University considers it a breach of academic integrity for the student to use automatic translators of any kind to complete an assignment. Furthermore, no compositions or other work should be written or edited for the student by a

native speaker of the target language, by a tutor or student assistant in the Foreign Language Resource Center, or by any other individual.

2. Disability Policy:

Kennesaw State University provides program accessibility and reasonable accommodations for persons identified as disabled under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. A number of services are available to help disabled students with their academic work. IV. METHOD OF EVALUATION

The FINAL COURSE GRADE will be based on three factors:

- (1) The Final Oral Examination given by the external examiner (60%)
- (2) The Final Written Examination (20%)
- (3) The summary of the biweekly reports of the tutors (20%)
