READ CAREFULLY AND KEEP. You are responsible for the contents.

PURPOSE: The purpose of this class is to introduce you to the study of World History. We will look at the meaning of history and how our view of the past is shaped. This survey will help you develop an appreciation of other people and other cultures and give you a better understanding of why the world in which you live is the way it is.

Textbook: Anthony Esler, The Human Venture: A World History from Prehistory to the Present. 5th edition. The text is an essential part of the course. Its primary purpose will be to provide chronological order and cover those areas not discussed in class.

Ethics: You are expected to be a responsible student. Read the current Kennesaw State University Catalog and familiarize yourself with such concepts as misrepresentation, plagiarism, unauthorized access to official materials and other regulations. *Students caught cheating will automatically receive a zero for their test!

Attendance Policy: Attendance for my class is mandatory. Students who miss seven class days will automatically fail the class. Students are required to sign a roll call sheet for every day of class. Please turn cell phones off during class.

TESTS: There will be ten tests given during the semester. Each individual test will count ten percent each. The tests will be no more than fifty questions. The questions for these tests will come from the textbook, class discussions, and other related materials.

PARTICIPATION GRADE: Students who do not want to take all ten tests have the option of presenting an individual presentation on a person or event in history and students can write a three page book review double space 12 font as well. However, students that choose to do both the presentation and a book review cannot do both of them on the same person or event! You will have to choose separate topics to write about. Students can also participate on two group projects as well. In theory if a student was to complete both the presentation and book review as well as working on both group projects, he or she could take six tests instead of ten. However, students must do one or the other; if you do not do any projects than you must take all ten tests!

MAKE-UP POLICY: Students are entitled to one make up exam only! If students miss more than one test than they will receive a grade of zero for each additional test they miss! A make up exam is intended for emergency purposes only! A make up exam is a new test and it is generally harder than a regular exam because the material comes

from the textbook only! Makeup exams will be administered only twice during the semester: Once after the midterm and the second time will be before the final exam.
