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Types of Resources

The following is a description of the types of reference resources that are listed in this bibliography. These resources can be found on the first floor of Horace W. Sturgis Library in the Reference Area.

Almanac:

An almanac is a publication, usually annual, containing a large collection of facts and statistics. It can pertain to a particular subject, such as the Almanac of Native Americans, or to a broader collection of data, such as the World Almanac.

Annotated Bibliography:

An annotated bibliography is a list of citations to books, articles, and documents. Each citation is followed by a brief (usually about 150 words) descriptive and evaluative paragraph, the annotation. The purpose of the annotation is to inform the reader of the relevance, accuracy, and quality of the sources cited.

Atlas:

An atlas is a collection of maps, traditionally bound into book form, but also found in multimedia formats, such as on CD-ROM. As well as geographic features and political boundaries, many often feature geopolitical, social, religious and economic statistics.

Biography:

A biography is a carefully researched, relatively full account of the facts of the life of a particular person, or closely related group of people, written by another. The person written about is the biographee. As in any historical work, the biographer presents, in continuous narrative, the most interesting and important events, usually with the aim of elucidating character, personality, and social context.

Book of Quotations:

Quotations are used to illustrate points of your discussion, or as evidence to support your arguments. They should be selected carefully, and used as sparingly as possible. The sources of quotations should be given as endnotes or footnotes, and given in full bibliographical detail.

Dictionary:

A dictionary is a book which defines the terms of a language, profession, discipline, or specialized area of knowledge. The terms are arranged in alphabetical order. Usually, a language dictionary will give the spelling, pronunciation, and meaning of each word. A dictionary of the words and terms of a restricted field of knowledge gives only the meanings.

ABRIDGED DICTIONARIES limit themselves to the most commonly used words. UNABRIDGED DICTIONARIES aim at a much higher level of completeness.

Directory:

Directories are reference books which provide listing of people, associations, institutions, companies, etc., as well as identifying information as addresses, telephone numbers, personnel, publications, and other unique data (ND).

Encyclopedia:

An encyclopedia is a reference source containing information on a variety of terms, persons, and events. This information may be supplied in short paragraphs or in lengthy articles that include citations to other works on the same topic. Encyclopedias can be general, covering all topics, or specialized, focusing on a particular discipline such as art or philosophy.

Handbook:

A handbook provides general information source which provides quick reference for a given subject area. Handbooks are generally subject-specific.

Index:

An index is a guide to the material published within other works, sometimes within books but more often within periodicals. Periodical indexes list every article for the periodicals and the period covered, listed alphabetically by author, title, and subject. Indexes include the source information you'll need to find each article, usually the periodical title, issue number, and page numbers. Indexes are available in print and in electronic form.

Manual/Guide:

A book of rules for guidance or instructions in how to perform a task, process, etc.

Periodicals:

A periodical is a publication with a distinctive title, which appears in successive numbers or parts at stated or regular intervals and which is intended to continue indefinitely. Usually each issue contains articles written by different contributors. Includes journals, magazines, newspapers, newsletters sold by subscription or at bookstores and other vendors. Example: *Journal of Abnormal Psychology*, *Maclean's*, *Vancouver Sun*. Please note that they are available in different formats. These include **Current, Bound, Microfilm, IAC and Online (Web 1 and 2)**.

This list of online, reliable primary sources, compiled by Grace-Ellen McCrann (chief, Government Documents Division, Cohen Library), draws material from government publications and international resources to create a portrait of SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome), the recently identified highly contagious disease. The sources provide details of this illness and information on subjects ranging from blood supply, case management, and general background to morbidity and mortality weekly reports, public health campaigns, and travel advisories. The links are limited in coverage to three months,

March through May 2003. Arrangement is topical, then chronological, making navigation straightforward and intuitive and allowing users to browse links organized in a topical directory. Links are consistent and active, and loading is quick and convenient because of the site's simplicity. This compilation of limited material is especially valuable to students, researchers, and general readers because it brings together in one place information scattered across different collections in print and online formats.
