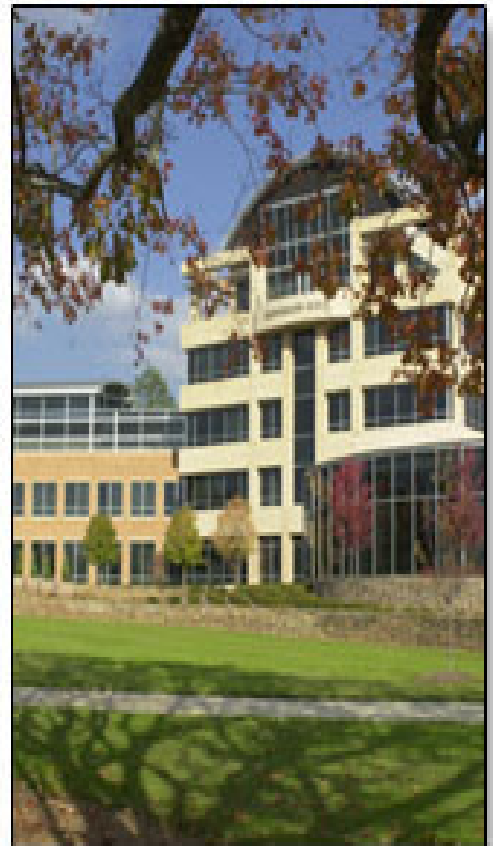

**KSU Professors Receive Cottrell Awards for Science**

In November of 2006, Dr. Jonathan McMurry and Dr. Carol Chrestensen, two of Kennesaw's newer professors, each received a Cottrell College Science Award from the Research Corporation Foundation. Together the awards will provide these researchers with over \$87,000 in funding over a two-year period. In recognition of this achievement, I conducted interviews with both Drs. McMurry and Chrestensen in which each professor answered questions about their research, its application, and their experiences with the grant writing process.

The first interviewee was Dr. Jonathan McMurry. His research focus is the assembly of the bacterial flagellum. I asked him to explain, in non-technical language, what the flagellum is and its purpose. According to Dr. McMurry, "The bacterium flagellum is an example of a molecular machine. I get to use the word nanotechnology because what I study is in fact a machine on the nano scale. It is a rotary machine by which bacteria move through their environment." How it assembles itself is of interest to science.

Dr. McMurry explained that his interest is the result of four years of research in a Yale laboratory where flagella was the subject and he was a postdoctoral fellow. When asked about the significance and application of his research, Dr. McMurry said, "We don't understand a lot about how the particular protein I'm studying is structured, but the flagellum is very similar to another structure called type three virulent secretion apparatus that is used by many species of bacteria to cause infection." Examples of such bacteria are salmonella, which causes diarrhea; pylori, which plays a role in gastric cancers; and y. pestis, which is the bacteria that causes bubonic plague. Dr. McMurry went on to say that the list of bacteria that use an organelle similar to that of the flagellum is lengthy, and knowledge about the disease mechanism is crucial in the search for effective treatments to bacterial disease.

In describing his grant writing experience, Dr. McMurry said he was thrilled with the immediate and active support provided by the OSP. "I am still to this day deliriously happy with Laura Letbetter and Caroline Elliott-Farino and the rest of the crew there who took my writing and turned it into something fundable." Dr McMurry said that he shares part of the success of Cottrell with his chemistry department colleagues, many of whom reviewed his proposal and offered feedback.

Dr. McMurry currently has two applications pending with NIH and the NSF and claims, "I have a little bit of pathology about me in that I love to write grants."

My next interview was with Dr. Carol Chrestensen, whose research focuses on cellular signaling. Cellular signaling is the complex system of communication that governs and coordinates basic cellular activities and actions. Dr. Chrestensen's graduate work focused on oxidated signals, and her post-graduate work focused on mitogen-activated signals and phosphorylation. Dr. Chrestensen explains phosphorylation this way: "Proteins (are) modified with a phosphate, and that tells the protein to do something different. It turns it on, turns it off; it depends on the particular protein."

Aging, inflammation, diabetes, and cancer are a few of the conditions in which oxidative signaling is key. How is the enzyme, which is important to stress signaling, impacted by oxidative signaling? Dr. Chrestensen wants to know. She says that understanding at the molecular level how oxidation modifies and changes the activities of enzymes will not prevent damage from occurring, but could stop the damage from cascading.

Dr. Chrestensen stated that the grant writing process encouraged her to explore new avenues and helped solidify her thoughts. "As difficult as the process is ... it is a productive way to channel your energies and your thoughts about going forward." Dr. Chrestensen thanked the OSP for making her aware of the Cottrell opportunity. "OSP was really helpful and suggested that this would be a great opportunity, and I'm really glad they did." In closing, Dr.Chrestensen also acknowledged friends and colleagues for taking the time to help with the process.

The Office of Sponsored Programs applauds Dr. McMurry and Dr. Chrestensen and wishes them continued success.

## UNDERSTANDING THE IRB

When do you need IRB approval? The short answer, according to IRB chair Martha Myers: "Any research involving human participants needs to be reviewed by the IRB." Of course, that is an oversimplification. Misconceptions and confusion about the IRB are common. For example, research on human subjects may conjure up images of medical research; however, something as simple as a survey can constitute human subject research. Myers adds, "Kennesaw State traditionally has a much broader definition of what constitutes human subject research than does IRB." Fortunately, the Kennesaw IRB website, [www.kennesaw.edu/irb](http://www.kennesaw.edu/irb), provides answers and guidelines. The "Start Here" link on the right side of the IRB home page makes access to this information easy and allows faculty to get a sense of what has to go through the IRB. Myers expressed concern that knowledge of the IRB website and its policies was uneven among the faculty. The main point for faculty to remember is that they should consult the IRB prior to collecting any data, however remote the possibility for publication.

## OVERLOADS ON FEDERAL GRANTS: WHY THEY'RE NOT ALLOWED

We often get requests from faculty for overloads on federally funded grants and contracts. Such overloads are not allowed at KSU. Unfortunately, the rationale behind the refusal to allow these overloads is not always understood. Recently, Phil Myers, Director of the Office of Sponsored Programs at Western Kentucky University, and Rich Dunfee, Director of the Grants Resource Center, coauthored an article entitled Personnel Practices and Federal Funding on Campus. The article is a concise explanation of the pitfalls associated with permitting overloads using federal funding and mirrors KSU's rationale for disallowance of such overloads: "In sum, the general rule is that the employee must use the base salary rate—and 100 percent is 100 percent."

Phil and Rich explain that the bases for personnel policy are Section J8 of OMB Circular A-21 and Section 611 of the NSF Grant Policy Manual. While the article was precipitated by the National Science Foundation's policy office review of its practices regarding time and effort reporting and grant faculty payroll, and the focus of the article is on NSF policies, the discussion is relevant to all federal agencies.

They write, "In practice, a 100 percent workload limitation on base salary was built on the notion of regular compensation and base salary rate language included in A-21. The interpretation that limited faculty to 100 percent employment emerged from the belief that most institutions do not allow regular faculty to teach overload classes or take overload administrative assignments. Therefore, the attitude of NSF was (and is) that institutions should not exceed these limitations just because they obtained federal money. The other factor that came into play was a desire on the part of NSF and other agencies to bring to an end a practice that involved an institution awarding release time to a faculty member to participate in grant activity, then allowing the faculty member to pick up the workload, in most cases a course, on overload. Thus, time and effort reporting was instituted, in part, to guarantee that colleges and universities were not violating the standards."

They go on to discuss the NSF limit of no more than two-ninths of base salary for summer work and the requirement to treat consulting within one's institution as regular payroll (meaning no overload). They quote Beth Strausser, NSF senior policy specialist: "Basically, for colleges and universities operating under OMB A-21, the NSF policy is that faculty members on academic year salaries charging NSF awards are limited to the NSF two-ninths rule regarding summer salaries and general A-21 restrictions on overload pay... NSF wants the scientist to be able to work the percentage outlined in the proposal that both the PI and the awardee organization committed to."

Federal agencies do make exceptions to this no-overload policy for what they would call a true overload (although KSU does not; keep reading to see why) – e.g. giving a lecture series and receiving a \$500 stipend or for work conducted at a remote site – when the overload is specifically mentioned in the proposal and subsequently approved by the awarding agency. However, as Phil and Rich point out, "a **federal audit can 'trump' federal sponsor approval**. This action might cause (and in some cases has caused) our institutions to repay the government for the release time improperly charged over 100 percent."

Now you know why KSU's policy is to disallow overloads with federal funding. While the federal policy door seems slightly ajar, the opening is not much more than a crack, and a slam in the face is a real possibility.
