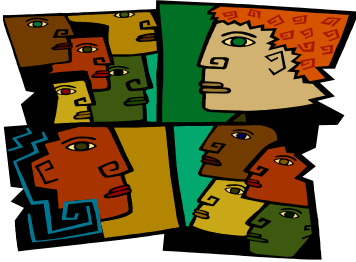

### *In Another Land:*

#### *Tourists, Sojourners, Immigrants, Refugees and Slaves*

*This course will explore issues of diversity by looking specifically at traveling to another country—temporarily or permanently, willingly or unwillingly—as a tourist, a sojourner, an immigrant, a refugee, or a slave. Psychological and sociological topics such as culture shock, acculturation, and intergroup relations will be explored in conjunction with relevant readings from literature and autobiographical and historical texts. To link the formal concepts to personal experience, students will be encouraged to draw on their own experiences of crossing national boundaries (and/or those of family and friends).*
