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IMPORTANT DATES AND DEADLINES

For Fall 2009 Advising and Registration

- March 12-26 **Mandatory KSU advising sessions** for newly accepted students. Select your fall course schedule and receive Accel form
- March 13-27 Meet with your guidance counselor to complete Part II of Accel application and get final approval on your course schedule
- March 30 Deadline for completed Accel application to be received by Honors Office prior to registration
- March 30 **Register for fall classes** from any computer with Internet access. JEHP students are encouraged to register March 30th while all classes are available. Registration continues through May 26th.
- April-May Higher One debit card will be mailed to you. Do not throw away this card! Follow instructions in the mailing to designate how you wish to receive textbook funds.
- July 20 **Joint Enrollment Summer Orientation**, 1-5 p.m.

CLASS SCHEDULING OPTIONS

Your top priority in choosing your classes is to ensure that you are taking the classes as well as the number of credits that you need to graduate from high school. If you have questions about what these are, please contact your high school guidance counselor. Joint Enrollment allows you to take both courses you need to graduate as well as electives – courses not needed for graduation, but that will give you a head start on completing your college core curriculum requirements.

Full-time/Part-time

JEHP seniors may choose to attend KSU either part-time or full-time. High school juniors typically are limited to attending KSU part-time, until they meet state eligibility requirements for the full range of college courses (see “Courses for JEHP Juniors” on p. 36).

1. **Full-time JEHP students** take 12 to 17 semester hours of academic credit, usually four or five courses. (Number of credits required varies depending on whether the school is on a block or traditional schedule – see box). Those who earn 15 hours each semester will complete the equivalent of their entire freshman year at KSU while simultaneously satisfying their high school graduation requirements. If you choose to enroll full-time and not attend your high school, it will be your responsibility to contact the high school regarding announcements that you may miss for cap and gown orders, graduation and prom dates and deadlines, etc.
2. **Part-time JEHP students** take fewer than 12 semester hours of academic credit (usually one to three courses). They will complete a portion of their freshman year at KSU while simultaneously taking courses at their high school. Note that KSU’s mandatory student fees are the same whether a student is taking one class or five classes, so students do not reduce their mandatory fees by taking fewer classes (see more information about expenses on page 45).

You may vary your number of classes from semester to semester, for instance, going part-time in Fall and full-time in Spring.

Note to varsity athletes: Some high schools require that varsity athletes take a minimum number of courses at the high school to maintain their athletic eligibility. Since this is a local decision, students should contact their high school counselor for their high school’s policy.

How many courses should I take?

Georgia Board of Education Rule 160-4-2-34 requires that students must generate the equivalent of no fewer than 5 Carnegie units within a school year. Carnegie units are earned as follows:

High school course	=	1 Carnegie unit
3-credit college course	=	.6 Carnegie unit
4-credit college lab course	=	.8 Carnegie unit

Whether a student chooses to split his or her time between the high school and KSU or to attend KSU full-time, he/she *must earn 5 Carnegie units per year*. See sample student schedules in the boxes that follow, and see your high school counselor if you have any questions about the number of Carnegie Units or specific courses you need to graduate.

Sample student schedules – “Traditional Schedule” high schools

Students attending a high school with a traditional schedule (classes meet every day for the entire school year), should typically be enrolled in a total of five courses throughout the school year. These may be divided between KSU and the high school. Students must earn a total of 5 Carnegie units per year.

Sample student schedules – “Block Schedule” high schools

Students attending a high school using a block schedule (semester-long classes) must typically take three to four classes per semester. These may be divided between KSU and the high school. Students must earn a total of 5 Carnegie units per year.

All schedules are subject to approval by your guidance counselor. Please see your counselor if you have any questions about the number of credits you need to graduate or specific classes needed for graduation.

Each 3-credit KSU course = .6 Carnegie Unit. Each 4-credit KSU lab course = .8 Carnegie Unit.

Honors Sections or Regular sections

Students may choose to enroll in honors sections, in which you will attend class with a cohort of Joint Enrollment students and some undergraduate honors students. Honors courses offer smaller class sizes and are taught by members of the Honors Faculty, faculty recognized for their outstanding teaching. Honors sections are similar to regular sections in terms of number of assignments, emphasizing quality rather than quantity or busy-work overload. *We receive very positive feedback from JEHP students on our honors sections, and strongly encourage JEHP students to try at least one honors course in Fall semester.* Honors courses are designated on the student's transcript.

Students who do not wish to enroll in honors courses may enroll in non-honors sections of the same courses.

Advanced Placement (AP) Credits

If you have completed an AP exam and scored a "3" or higher, you are eligible to exempt introductory course(s) in that discipline. A list of qualifying AP exam scores and corresponding course exemptions appears at the end of each subject area in the next section of this booklet. If you are currently enrolled in an AP class and will take the exam this summer, please let your KSU advisor know when you come to your advising session. As soon as you receive your scores, you must provide them to the KSU Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall so that you will be cleared in the registration system for the course exemption.

Course Options

JEHP students are eligible to take many courses listed in the KSU undergraduate catalog, so long as they meet course prerequisites. **Examples of courses most commonly taken by JEHP students that will be paid for from HOPE/Accel funds are listed in the "At a Glance: KSU Joint Enrollment Course Correlations" chart that follows.** Be sure to read course eligibility and prerequisite requirements and course descriptions in this packet before choosing your classes.

In certain subject areas, the state specifies that only particular college courses will substitute for the high school requirements. These are as follows:

- ENGL 1101 and ENGL 1102 are the only courses that satisfy the state requirements for the senior year of English. If a student's AP scores exempt them out of one or both of these courses, they must take ENGL 2110 and a second English course of their choosing to earn the fourth unit of high school English.
- POLS 1101 is the only political science course that satisfies the high school requirement for American Government.
- Students needing a unit of World History must take HIST 1110 (fall) and HIST 3305 (Spring).

In other subject areas, students have flexibility to choose between a wider array of courses. See the following subject area sections of this book for course options.

Electives

In addition to taking the courses you need to graduate from high school, you may take other courses at KSU that would be considered "electives" by your high school, because they are not needed for you to graduate. In order to receive funding through Accel for these courses, your high school guidance counselor must list these courses or indicate "English Elective," "Math Elective," "Social Studies Elective," etc., on Part II of the Accel application.

Students who do not intend to remain at KSU after high school graduation are encouraged to visit the websites of their schools of choice to identify that school's curricular requirements. Bring this to your advising session, and we will assist you in choosing equivalent KSU courses.

The above courses are covered by Accel, with guidance counselor approval.

Accel Restrictions on Course Selection

Accel is the component of the HOPE Scholarship program that pays tuition and most fees for Joint Enrollment Students. Accel pays for courses in disciplines considered to be part of the core curriculum in Georgia high schools. Accel will pay for courses in English, Math, Science, Social Sciences (history, philosophy, psychology, sociology, anthropology, political science, communication), Foreign Languages, and Economics. The Georgia Student Finance Commission publishes a directory of courses that are approved for payment by Accel, which may be viewed at www.gsfc.org, and is reprinted for you in the final pages of this booklet. Students must select courses from the Accel-approved list in order to ensure that they will be paid for from their HOPE Scholarship funds. Note that not all courses on this state-wide list are available at Kennesaw State University.

IMPORTANT - Accel will not pay for:

- **Courses you have already completed in high school.** For instance, if you have completed American History and World History in high school, in most cases Accel will not pay for you to take them in college while in Joint Enrollment. An exception is made if the high school counselor approves the course as an elective. Because of the increased level of rigor, General Chemistry (CHEM 1211) is excepted and is available to students who've had chemistry in high school.
- **Courses outside the ACCEL-approved list.** You may elect to take courses that are not on the Accel list, but you must pay tuition for these courses. An exception to this is the "bonus" course opportunity below for students taking a full-load of courses at KSU.
- **Art, music, theatre, physical education, business, computer science, and other courses outside the core disciplines.** Accel was designed to pay for courses in high school core curriculum disciplines.

"Bonus" course opportunity for students taking 12 credits or more

All students taking 12 or more credit hours are considered full-time students and pay the same amount of tuition, whether they are taking 12, 15, or 16 credit hours. If you enroll in 12 credit hours of coursework that is covered by Accel, your tuition and fees at the full-time level are covered by Accel. This allows you to take an additional course, which may be on or off the Accel list, for no additional charge, because your tuition and fees as a full-time student have already been paid. Joint Enrollment Students may not enroll in more than five courses per term.

Selecting courses that will apply to your future major

We encourage students to go to the websites of their schools of choice to view the required general education (also called "core") curriculum, as well as the curriculum for the majors they are considering. Print out the curriculum and bring it to your advising session. Then students can work with their KSU advisor to identify the equivalent courses at KSU. If KSU is your destination of choice, we have provided KSU's core curriculum on the following page.

Courses taken in joint enrollment typically fall in the core curriculum area, and are generally a safe bet to transfer to the core curriculum at other public colleges and universities. There are some nuances that make it worthwhile to view other schools' curriculum, however. For example, Georgia Tech will not count any math lower than Calculus toward its degrees. Be aware that policies for accepting joint enrollment credits vary among private colleges, and this is something you should inquire about with the admissions office of those schools if you are considering a private college.

ADVISING AND REGISTRATION

As a Joint Enrollment Honors student, you will enjoy early registration privileges that allow you to register before most other KSU students. **Participation in a mandatory KSU advising session and completion of a new Accel application with your high school guidance counselor is required each semester before JEHP students will be permitted to register.** You will receive a mailing prior to Advising sessions with information about specific dates and times. All KSU registration is done online via computer.

- **Mandatory advising for fall semester** will take place in March. After discussing course options at your advising session, you will create a schedule and complete Part I and II of the Accel application for your guidance counselor's approval. After returning these to KSU, you will be cleared in the computer system for registration.
- **Online registration for fall semester** will open for JEHP students on **Monday, March 30th**. **If you do not register for classes on this date, we cannot guarantee you will get the classes and class times that you need.** You will need your 9- digit KSU ID number that appears on your Admissions acceptance letter and a 6-digit PIN number, made up of your birth month (2 digits), birth day (2 digits) and birth year (2 digits) to access the computer registration system. We will provide complete instructions at your advising session.
- Once you have registered for your classes, you will not be able to change your schedule without the permission of the Honors Office and your high school counselor.
- **Mandatory advising for spring semester** will take place during the month of October. You will attend a mandatory KSU advising session, complete another Accel application for spring semester classes and again get your guidance counselor to sign and seal the Accel form. All JEHP students will register on the first day of Priority Registration, November 2nd.

CHANGING YOUR SCHEDULE

Any changes to your schedule must be made during the Drop/Add period, typically the first week of classes. If you believe you are in over your head or have signed up for the wrong class, contact the Honors Office immediately to request a change of schedule. You must also contact your guidance counselor to receive approval for the change. At that point we will remove a computer block on your registration and you will be able to make the course change.

WITHDRAWING FROM A COURSE

If you would like to withdraw from a course after the Drop/Add period, you must officially withdraw from the course by completing an online Withdrawal form available on the Registrar's Office webpage. You must do this prior to the university's published "Last Day to Withdraw without Academic Penalty" date, typically at midterm. Do NOT just stop attending classes! You must also notify the Honors Office and your guidance counselor that you intend to withdraw from a KSU course.

Withdrawing prior to the “Last Day to Withdraw without Academic Penalty” date:

Consequences:

- If the course was required for your high school graduation, you may jeopardize your ability to graduate with your class. You will need to investigate alternate ways to complete the requirement with your guidance counselor.
- Accel may require you to pay back all or a portion of your tuition.
- Your KSU transcript will show a “W” for that class, rather than a grade. The “W” will not impact your GPA.

Withdrawing after the “Last Day to Withdraw without Academic Penalty” date:

Consequences:

- If the course was required for your high school graduation, you may jeopardize your ability to graduate with your class. You will need to investigate alternate ways to complete the requirement with your guidance counselor.
- Your KSU transcript will show a “WF” for that class, rather than a grade. The “WF” will compute as an “F” on your KSU and high school transcripts, negatively impacting your GPA and HOPE eligibility.
- Accel may require you to pay back all or a portion of your tuition.

ACADEMIC DISMISSAL FROM JEHP

Because this is an honors program, students who earn a GPA of less than 2.0 in their KSU courses during Fall semester will be dismissed from JEHP and required to return to their high schools for Spring semester. Students earning an “F” in a course required for graduation will be required to repeat that course at their high school, but may remain in the JEHP program for other classes so long as their overall GPA is a 2.0 or higher. Participation in JEHP is a privilege; disruptive classroom behavior may also be a cause for dismissal.

ENGLISH OPTIONS

For Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Students must have completed 3 units of high school English before taking a college English class for dual credit.

Advising notes: To satisfy the fourth unit of high school English, students must take two semesters of college English. Please note that ENGL 1101 and ENGL 1102 are the only courses that satisfy these high school requirements, unless you have an AP score of 3 or higher. If you take English 1101 for high school graduation credit during fall semester and make a grade of D or F in the course, you will not be permitted to continue with English at KSU in spring semester, and must contact your counselor IMMEDIATELY to discuss alternative means of completing my English requirement. If you have AP credits and can exempt ENGL 1101 (and for some, ENGL 1102), you still need to take two additional advanced English courses to satisfy the fourth unit requirement for high school English.

Course descriptions for the following are provided in the Course Descriptions section later in this booklet.

- ENGL 1101 – Composition I

Students may choose to take Honors sections or non-honors sections of ENGL 1101. Honors sections, offered Fall semester, provide smaller class sizes, opportunities to interact with KSU undergraduate honors students, and are taught by members of the Honors Faculty. Students failing to make a C or better in this course will not be allowed to enroll in ENGL 1102 in the spring semester and must contact their high school counselors to make arrangements for fulfilling their high school graduation requirements.

- ENGL 1102 – Composition II

Prerequisite: C or better in ENGL 1101. Students may choose to take Honors sections or non-honors sections of ENGL 1102. Honors sections, offered Spring semester, provide smaller class sizes, opportunities to interact with KSU undergraduate honors students, and are taught by members of the Honors Faculty.

English-Area Electives:

Additional KSU English courses are not available to most JEHP students because they all require ENGL 1102 as a prerequisite (students with AP exemptions may move on to higher courses – see next page). The following Communication courses are available to all JEHP students and are recorded on your Accel form as English electives:

COM 1109 – Human Communication (3 credits)

COM 2129 – Public Speaking (3 credits)

At many colleges, one or the other of these courses is a part of the general education curriculum. At other schools, these courses will transfer as free electives. We encourage you to visit the website of your college and major of choice to help you in selecting your classes.

If you are taking AP English in high school:

Students with scores of 3 or 4 on the English Language or English Literature AP exams will exempt ENGL 1101 and may enroll in ENGL 1102. Students with a score of 5 will exempt ENGL 1101 and ENGL 1102, and enroll in ENGL 2110. If you are currently enrolled in AP English but have not yet taken the AP test, notify your advisor at your KSU advising session. We will request a prerequisite override from the English Department to place you in ENGL 1102. You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3, and will need to change your schedule to ENGL 1101. Similarly, if you should score a 5, contact us immediately so that we can seek space for you in ENGL 2110. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board. All students required to take a fourth unit of high school English must take two semesters of KSU English classes.

MATHEMATICS OPTIONS for Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Mathematics courses are available to both high school juniors and seniors in the Joint Enrollment Honors Program. Students must have completed Algebra I, Algebra II and Geometry in their high schools before taking college math courses.

Advising Notes: Students who need to complete the fourth unit of high school math for graduation will need two college-level mathematics courses. You may select from the following pairings, with your high school counselor's approval. Math courses may also be taken as electives by students who have already completed all high school math requirements. If you need two semesters of college math for high school graduation, take one of those courses at KSU in the fall semester and FAIL that course, you may not continue with Math at KSU in Spring semester, and must contact your high school counselor IMMEDIATELY to discuss alternative means of completing your mathematics requirement.

All students wishing to take a Math course at KSU must take KSU's online Math Placement Test (MAPT) at <http://placement.kennesaw.edu/> to determine the level of college math most appropriate for you. This helps ensure that you will not enroll in a course that is overly advanced or redundant of what you have covered in high school. Print out your results and bring them to you advising session. You will not be approved to take KSU math courses without your MAPT results. If you KNOW you will not be taking math at KSU, you do not need to take the MAPT.

To help you in your selection of Math courses, we encourage you to visit the website of the specific major at the college that you are considering to see what math courses it requires. For instance, if you plan to major in business, many colleges and universities require business majors to complete Precalculus or Calculus. Check at your school and major of interest to see specific course requirements.

- I. If a) you know you will not be pursuing a math- or science-related degree in college or b) you are not sure of your college major but do not wish to take a college-level pre-calculus or calculus course:

Fall Semester: Math 1101 (Mathematical Modeling)

and

Spring Semester: Math 1106 (Elementary Applied Calculus – recommended for business majors)

or

Math 1107 (Statistics)

- II. Students with stronger math aptitudes or backgrounds who a) will not be pursuing a math- or science-related degree in college or b) are not sure of college major may also consider:

Fall Semester: Math 1111 (College Algebra)

and

Spring Semester: Math 1112 (College Trigonometry)

or

Math 1107 (Statistics)

- III. If a) you know you WILL be pursuing a math- or science- related degree in college, but not have not completed Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry or Analysis with an A or B in high school; or b) you are proficient in math but lack the exceptionally strong foundation in trigonometry necessary to perform well in a college calculus course:

Fall Semester: Math 1113 (Precalculus)

and

Spring Semester: Math 1190 (Calculus I)*

*You must have made an A or B in Math 1113 to enroll in Math 1190

- IV. If a) you know you will be pursuing a math- or science- related degree in college AND have completed either Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry or Analysis with an A or B in high school; or b) are highly proficient in math and have an exceptionally strong foundation in trigonometry:

Fall Semester: Math 1190 (Calculus I)

and

Spring Semester: Math 2202 (Calculus II)*

*You must have made an A or B in Math 1190 to enroll in Math 2202

If you have taken or are taking Advanced Placement Tests in Math:

KSU's AP policy is as follows:

AB Calculus: Students scoring a 3 will exempt out of MATH 1113 – Precalculus and take Math 1190 – Calculus I. Students scoring a 4 or 5 will exempt out of Math 1190 – Calculus I and could take MATH 2202 – Calculus II.

BC Calculus: Students scoring a 3 will exempt out of Math 1190 – Calculus I and can take MATH 2202 – Calculus II. Students scoring a 4 or 5 will exempt out of Math 1190 and Math 2202 and choose higher level math electives.

Statistics: Students scoring a 3, 4 or 5 will exempt out of Math 1107 - Statistics.

If you are currently enrolled in AP math but have not yet taken the AP test, notify your advisor at your KSU advising session. We will request a prerequisite override from the Math Department to place you in the next highest level of math. You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3, and will need to change your schedule accordingly. Similarly, if you should score a 4 or 5, contact us immediately so that we can seek space for you in the higher level math course. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board.

ECONOMICS OPTIONS

For Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Students must be “on track” in their high school social studies curriculum before taking dual-credit college courses in Economics. This means that you should have completed all social studies courses required through the junior year of high school before taking Economics or American Government.

Important Advising Notes: Only the Honors section of ECON 1100 is specifically designed for JEHP students to incorporate concepts of both macro- and micro-economics that will be covered in the high school End of Course Test in Economics. Students who choose other sections of ECON 1100 will not receive the depth of instruction in both macro-and micro-economics topics.

To help you in your selection of Economics courses, we encourage you to visit the website of the specific major at the college that you are considering to see what courses it requires. Some colleges do not require an Economics course in their general education curriculum or for particular majors. If your school/major of choice does not require economics, your KSU economics course will transfer as a free elective.

Some majors (frequently Business majors) require students to take Microeconomics (KSU's ECON 2100), and will treat the more general ECON 1100 as an elective. Either of these courses will fulfill the high school graduation requirement; however, students choosing Microeconomics may need to prepare on their own for the high school End of Course Test, which covers primarily micro-economics, but some macro-economics topics. You may view study guides for the high school Economics End of Course Test at the Georgia Department of Education's website: http://public.doe.k12.ga.us/ci_testing.aspx?PageReg=CI_TESTING_EOCT.

Recommended for JEHP students:

ECON 1100H – Global Economics (3 credits)

See Advising notes above.

The Honors section of ECON 1100 is typically offered in Spring semester.

Other Economics options:

ECON 2100 – Principles of Microeconomics (3 credits)

Prerequisite: 3 credit hours of Math numbered 1101 or higher. See advising notes above.

ECON 2200 – Principles of Macroeconomics (3 credits)

Prerequisite: ECON 2100 and 6 credit hours of Math numbered 1101 or higher
See advising notes above.

Note: ECON 2100 and 2200 carry a Business Core Course fee of \$30 each, which is not covered by Accel.

Course descriptions for the above courses are provided in the pages that follow.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE OPTIONS for Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Foreign language courses are available to juniors and seniors in the JEHP program. Students must have taken two units of high school foreign language to enroll in a college foreign language course. You may continue in the same language or select a new language to learn.

To help you in your selection of Foreign language courses, we encourage you to visit the website of the specific major at the college that you are considering to see its foreign language requirements. Note that not all majors require a foreign language.

KSU offers the following languages, although not all will be offered every semester. Check current course listings (available at your advising session) for availability.

*Courses marked with an asterisk are part of KSU's Critical Languages program.

Introductory courses for these languages tend to be offered in Fall only, so students wishing to begin one of these languages must begin in the fall. In accordance with standards set by the National Association of Self-Instructional Language Programs, these courses involve self-instruction and classroom meetings emphasizing speaking and oral comprehension, led by a tutor, typically an international student who is a native speaker of that language. Testing is conducted by a faculty member from another institution who will visit campus on test days. Because the Critical Languages instructional format is different in this way from traditional instruction, we encourage JEHP students who are interested in these languages to read the student handbook at http://www.kennesaw.edu/foreignlanguage/student_guide.html. Courses not marked with an asterisk are traditional-format classes taught by a KSU faculty member.

Choosing the appropriate level course

- Students who are selecting a new language to learn, or have had **only one semester** of this language in high school, should take an introductory-level course in the language at KSU, numbered 1001 (e.g., French 1001).
- Students who have taken **two semesters (or one year)** of a single foreign language in high school should be eligible for the second course in that language at KSU, numbered 1002 (e.g., French 1002).
- Students who have had **two years or more** of French, Spanish or German in high school must take the placement test (see below) offered by the Foreign Language Department in these languages **prior to the KSU advising session**. It is a computerized test which takes approximately 20 minutes to complete, and will indicate which level of college course is appropriate for you. Depending on the level of rigor in your high school classes, foreign language courses at the 2001 or 2002 level may or may not be appropriate for you.

Placement Testing Instructions

If you have had two or more years of high school Spanish, German or French and wish to continue in the same language at KSU, you must take a computerized placement test online or in the Foreign Language Resource Center **prior to your advising session** to determine the course level most appropriate for you. Bring your results to your advising session. You will not be approved to take non-introductory language courses at the 2001-level or higher without your placement results. The placement test is not required for students starting a new language or those with less than two years of a particular language in high school.

The Online Placement Exam is designed to help you determine the first course you should take, based on your ability. This multiple-choice exam presents questions of different ability levels, adapting the next question's level according to your answers. The number of questions you will be required to complete depends upon your ability to use the language. The duration of the test varies, but it usually takes 15-20 minutes to complete.

Choose the appropriate language from the drop-down menu. After completing the short survey you can begin the exam.

When the placement exam is complete, you will receive an overall score (points). Please note the RANGE OF SCORES FOR PLACEMENT PURPOSES area and the course level that corresponds to your points. This is the course in which KSU recommends you enroll. Print this page and bring it to your Advising Session. If the recommendation is for the 2001 or 2002 level, the Honors Office will request a prerequisite override for you from the Department of Foreign Languages.

The placement test is also available in person at the Foreign Language Resource Center, located in the Pilcher Building, adjoining the Library, in Room 134. Hours are M-Th 9-9 and Fridays 11-4. It is preferable to make an appointment by calling 678-797-2197.

If you are currently enrolled in AP foreign language but have not yet taken the AP test, notify your advisor at your KSU advising session. We will request a prerequisite override from the Foreign Language Department to place you in the course appropriate for those scoring a 3. You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3, and will need to change your schedule. Similarly, if you should score a 4-5, contact us immediately so that we can seek space for you in the higher level class. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board.

HISTORY OPTIONS for Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: History courses are available for dual credit only to students who have not completed them in high school. Most high schools require completion of American History and World history prior to the senior year, so students at those schools are not eligible for KSU history courses. However, beginning with the 2006-07 year, some high schools have changed World History to a senior-level requirement. Students at these schools are eligible to take World History at KSU. Two semesters of college world history are required to equate to the high school world history course.

The following history course pairing is available to Joint Enrollment students who have not completed World History in high school. BOTH courses must be taken to satisfy the high school requirement.

Fall semester:

HIST 1110 – Introduction to World Civilizations (3 credits)

Spring semester:

HIST 3305 – The World Since 1945 (3 credits)

See course descriptions in the pages that follow.

If you have taken or are taking AP U.S. History:

Students scoring a 3-5 on the AP exam may exempt HIST 2111 & 2112, and enroll in a higher level history course. Your counselor must approve this as an elective in order for it to be covered by Accel. If you are currently enrolled in AP history but have not yet taken the AP test, notify your advisor at your KSU advising session. We will request a prerequisite override from the History Department to place you in the course appropriate for those scoring a 3. You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3, and will need to change your schedule. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board.

SCIENCE OPTIONS for Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Students must have completed three units of high school science prior to enrolling in a college science course.

Advising notes: In most cases, Accel will not pay for science courses that you have previously completed in high school. For example, if you have completed biology in high school, Accel will not pay for you to take it in college. Exceptions are made if your counselor lists the course as an elective, e.g., “Biology elective,” on your Accel form. You must also meet KSU’s prerequisites for science courses.

Lab fees: Science courses with labs require a lab fee, typically \$25-\$40. Lab fees are not covered by Accel, and will appear on your student invoice statement after registration.

To help you in your selection of science courses, we encourage you to visit the website of the specific major at the college that you are considering to see its science requirements.

The following science courses are available to Joint Enrollment students who have not completed these courses in high school. See course descriptions later in this booklet. **You must complete two college courses in Science to equate to one high school unit of science.**

I. If you know you will not be majoring in a Science discipline:

SCI 1101 – Science, Society and the Environment I. (4 credits – includes online lab)

SCI 1102 – Science, Society and the Environment II (3 credits)

II. If you are considering majoring in a Science discipline, select from the following:

Biology

BIOL 2107 - Biological Principles I (4 credits) is intended for science majors and has prerequisites of Chemistry 1211/1211L and MATH 1113, so Joint Enrollment students are NOT ELIGIBLE to take it in the fall and should only consider taking it in the Spring if they are planning to major in biology or a related field.

BIOL 2221 – Human Anatomy & Physiology I (3 credits) & BIOL 2221Lab (1 credit)
Co-requisite: Must take CHEM 1151 and CHEM 1151L, or CHEM 1211 & 1211L, or SCI 1101 at the same time. Note: This course cannot be used for credit toward a Biology degree at KSU, but could be used as an elective.

Chemistry

If you have not had Chemistry in high school*:

CHEM 1151 – Survey of Chemistry I (3 credits)

Co-requisite: Must be taken with CHEM 1151L – Survey of Chemistry I Lab (1 credit)

CHEM 1152 – Survey of Chemistry II (3 credits)

Must be taken with CHEM 1152L – Survey of Chemistry II Lab (1 credit)

Prerequisite: CHEM 1151

**The 1151/1152 course sequence was designed for nursing and education majors at KSU and may not transfer easily to other schools. It will fulfill the science requirement for non-science majors if you remain at KSU.*

If you have completed Chemistry in high school, intend to transfer to another college or university, or to major in a science at KSU, the following is a more advanced course sequence appropriate for you.

CHEM 1211 – General Chemistry I (3 credits)

Prerequisite: Completed high school Chemistry on CHEM 1151

Must be taken with CHEM 1211L – General Chemistry Lab (1 credit)

Co-requisite: Must be enrolled in MATH 1112 or MATH 1113 at the same time

CHEM 1212 – General Chemistry II (3 credits)

Must be taken with CHEM 1212L – General Chemistry Lab (1 credit)

Co-requisite: Must be enrolled in MATH 1190 at the same time

Note: Chemistry lab courses carry a lab fee of \$35 that is not covered by Accel.

Physics

Since the following courses require a STRONG background in precalculus, we recommend your taking them only if you have successfully completed Math 1113 at KSU or have completed Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, and Analysis with a “B” or better in high school. If the latter, let the Honors Office know that you will need to seek a pre-requisite waiver from KSU’s Department of Biological and Physical Sciences.

PHYS 1111 – Introductory Physics I (4 credits)

Prerequisite: “C” or better in Math 1113-Precalculus or exemption of MATH 1113 through KSU’s math placement test or AP.

PHYS 1112 – Introductory Physics II (4 credits). Prerequisite: PHYS 1111.

Note: Physics courses carry a lab fee of \$35 that is not covered by Accel.

If you are currently enrolled in AP science but have not yet taken the AP test, notify your advisor at your KSU advising session. We will request a prerequisite override from the appropriate department to place you in the course appropriate for those scoring a 3. You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3 or above the score for the next higher course exemption. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board.

SOCIAL SCIENCE OPTIONS for Joint Enrollment Honors Students

Eligibility: Students must be “on track” in their high school social studies curriculum before taking dual-credit college courses in Anthropology, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, or Sociology. This means you must have completed the courses required at your high school through the junior year before taking KSU courses in these areas.

Advising notes: Courses are generally not covered by Accel if the student has previously completed these courses in high school. For instance, if a student has taken Psychology in high school, Accel will not pay for them to take Psychology at KSU, and they should select an alternative course, such as sociology or anthropology.

To help you in your selection of social science courses, we encourage you to visit the website of the college that you are considering to see its general education requirements as well as requirements of the major that you are interested in. Note that some programs may only require students to take one social science course in their general education curriculum. Additional courses would count as free electives.

Anthropology core course:

You must contact us immediately when you receive your scores if they fall below a 3, and will need to change your schedule. You will need to bring a copy of your score report to the Registrar's Office in Kennesaw Hall, or have one sent directly from the College Board.

Concert Band

A seating audition is required during the first week of classes, but will not exclude students from participating; it is used as an evaluative measure to help the conductor know about the performer's current level of proficiency and determine seating placement.

KSU Orchestra

The orchestra performs a wide repertoire from all time periods and styles. The students in the orchestra are made up of music majors and non-music majors, with an interest in orchestral repertoire. The group will begin touring next year and has performed with guest soloists. Future plans include exciting repertoire with numerous guest soloists and conductors.

Seating auditions

The KSU Orchestra is open to all students at KSU. A seating audition is required during the first week of classes, but will not exclude students from participating; it is used as an evaluative measure to help the conductor know about the performer's current level of proficiency and determine your seating placement. The audition is very brief and consists of a short etude or solo of the player's choice. **Wind players should audition for the KSU Wind Ensemble.** Based on that audition, players will be invited to join and register for the orchestra.

The KSU Wind Ensemble

The Kennesaw State University Wind Ensemble performs a diverse repertoire for winds and percussion encompassing chamber music, wind ensemble repertoire and works for large bands.

Regularly the KSU Wind Ensemble is visited by leading composers, performers, and conductors. Recent visits include those by The Atlanta Symphony Brass Quintet, The Atlanta Percussion Trio, Quartetto Gelato, The Detroit Chamber Winds and Strings, composers Jennifer Higdon, David Masklanka and Eric Ewazen, conductors H. Robert Reynolds and Alexander Mickelthwate, and members of the orchestras in Philadelphia, Boston, and Atlanta. Committed to collaboration, the KSU Wind Ensemble has given joint concerts with bands and wind ensembles at Emory University, Georgia Institute of Technology, and Georgia Perimeter College.

Many members of the KSU Wind Ensemble come from distinguished honors ensembles including The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony, The Metropolitan Youth Symphony Orchestra and The Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra. While many KSU Wind Ensemble members have continued their studies at leading music schools like Juilliard, The University of Michigan, Northwestern University, The New England Conservatory, Indiana University, and Roosevelt University, other graduates are offered positions as music educators throughout the state of Georgia. Additionally, Since 1999 KSU Wind Ensemble musicians have earned 71 positions in The National Wind Ensemble for performances in Carnegie Hall.

Seating Auditions

The KSU Wind Ensemble is open to all students at KSU. Music Majors are required to perform a seating audition for the Wind Ensemble during the first week of classes. Others are encouraged to play seating auditions. The audition will be brief. Members should be prepared to perform two selections. One selection will demonstrate technical proficiency and the other will demonstrate lyric proficiency. Percussionists should demonstrate proficiency on snare, mallets, and timpani.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

For Courses Commonly Taken by JEHP students

ANTHROPOLOGY (ANTH)

- See "Social Science Options" guidelines

ANTH 2201. Introduction to Anthropology. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Introduction to anthropology's four major subfields: biological anthropology, archaeology, cultural anthropology, and linguistics.

More advanced anthropology courses are available to students who have completed ANTH 2201.

BIOLOGY (BIOL)

- See "Science Options" guidelines

- **IMPORTANT:** BIOL 2107 is for science majors and has prerequisites of Chemistry 1211/1211L and MATH 1113, so Joint Enrollment students are NOT ELIGIBLE to take it in the fall and should not consider taking it in the spring unless they have met all prerequisite requirements and are planning to major in biology or a related field. If you would like to register for a science course, see first: Chemistry: CHEM 1211-1212; Science: SCI 1101-1102, or Physics: PHYS 1111-1112.

BIOL 2107. Biological Principles I. (4 credits). Prerequisite: CHEM 1211/1211L. A cellular approach to biology. Topics include cell chemistry, cell structure and function, energy metabolism and cell differentiation, and techniques used to study them. Laboratories employ principles of spectrophotometry and differential centrifugation to examine enzyme kinetics, quantification of protein and subcellular fractionation. For science majors.

CHEMISTRY (CHEM)

- See "Science Options" guidelines

- **IMPORTANT:** Chemistry 1151 and 1152 are designed primarily for Nursing students and may not transfer easily. JEHP students who have had high school chemistry should take the more advanced CHEM 1211-1212 sequence (with accompanying labs). JEHP students who have NOT had high school chemistry should consider taking the SCI 1101-1102 sequence unless they are interested in going into a science major.

CHEM 1151. Survey of Chemistry I. (3 credit hours). Corequisite: CHEM 1151L. General principles of atomic structure, bonding, reaction, solutions, equilibria as required for a basic understanding of physiological applications. A brief introduction to organic compounds which are of particular importance in pharmacological applications.

CHEM 1151L. (1 credit). Laboratory course to study and apply topics and concepts covered in CHEM 1151.

CHEM 1152. Survey of Chemistry II. (3 credit hours). A study of the classes of organic molecules including their common uses and physical and chemical properties. An introductory look at the structure and function of biological macromolecules.

CHEM 1152L. (1 credit). Laboratory course to study and apply the topics and concepts covered in CHEM 1152.

CHEM 1211. General Chemistry I. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: High school chemistry or CHEM 1151.** **Corequisites: Chem 1211L, MATH 1113.** First course in a two-semester sequence covering the fundamental principles and applications of chemistry. Course content includes electronic structure of atoms and molecules, bonding fundamentals, fundamentals of chemical reactions, and gas laws.

CHEM 1211L. General Chemistry I Laboratory. (1 credit hour). Prerequisite: None. **Corequisite: CHEM 1211, MATH 1113.** First laboratory course in general chemistry. Designed to introduce the student to the application of cognitive skills utilizing chemical knowledge in the laboratory.

CHEM 1212. General Chemistry II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: CHEM 1211. Corequisite: CHEM 1212L.** Second course in a two-semester sequence covering the fundamental principles and applications of chemistry for science majors. Course content includes chemical kinetics, chemical thermodynamics, liquids and solids, properties of solutions, chemical equilibrium, acids and bases, electrochemistry, and qualitative analysis.

CHEM 1212L. General Chemistry II Laboratory. (1 credit hour). **Prerequisite: CHEM 1211, CHEM 1211L.** **Corequisite: CHEM 1212.** Second laboratory course in general chemistry. Designed to continue the application of cognitive skills utilizing chemical knowledge in the laboratory including qualitative analysis techniques.

COMMUNICATION (COM)

COM 1109. Human Communication. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. An introduction to the fundamental components of the human communication process, emphasizing selected concepts, methods, and practice in dyadic, small group, and presentational settings. Covers such areas as information gathering, message design, audience considerations, verbal/nonverbal approaches, discussion/delivery strategies, critical analysis, and related media technology support resources. Includes student speaking assignments. Counts as an English Elective.

COM 2129. Public Speaking. (3 credit hours). Methods and practice in effective oral communication, with an emphasis on speech preparation and presentation. Counts as an English elective. For students who intend to remain at KSU, this course will substitute for COM 1109 in the core curriculum.

ECONOMICS (ECON)

➤ See “Economics Options” guidelines

ECON 1100. Global Economics. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Analysis of economic decision-making in a global setting. Examines the fundamental questions of economics as they relate to individuals, firms, and governments operating in an open economy. Topics covered include: a comparison of economic systems, how a market system works, the role of government in the economy, the basis for international trade, the dynamics of the global monetary system, and the impact of technology on economic growth. For non-business majors.

➤ **IMPORTANT: Honors section of ECON 1100 is offered during the SPRING semester only.**

ECON 2100. Principles of Microeconomics. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: 3 credit hours of MATH numbered 1101 or higher.** Analysis of price and output determination under various market structures, income distribution, resource allocation, domestic problems and international trade. For business majors and International Affairs majors. **Joint Enrollment students may substitute ECON 2100 for Economics 1100 with their high school counselor’s permission. Please note, however, that this substitution is NOT ADVISED for students without a strong mathematics background. Students will have to study macroeconomics principles on their own to prepare for the high school End of Course Test.**

ECON 2200 – Principles of Macroeconomics (3 credits). Prerequisite: ECON 2100 and 6 credit hours of Math numbered 1101 or higher. Analysis of socioeconomic goals, money and credit systems, theories of national income, employment and economic growth.

ENGLISH (ENGL)

➤ See “English Options” guidelines

ENGL 1101. Composition I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Focuses on skills required for effective writing in a variety of contexts with emphasis on exposition, analysis, and argumentation. Also includes introductory use of a variety of research skills.

➤ **IMPORTANT: Honors sections offered during the FALL semester only. Joint Enrollment Students failing to make a C or better in this course will not be allowed to enroll in ENGL 1102 in the spring semester and must contact their high school counselors to make arrangements for fulfilling their high school graduation requirements.**

ENGL 1102. Composition II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: ENGL 1101 (with C or better)**. Develops writing skills beyond the levels of proficiency required by ENGL 1101. Interpretation and evaluation are emphasized, and a variety of more advanced research methods are incorporated.

➤ **IMPORTANT: Honors sections typically offered during the SPRING semester only.**

FOREIGN LANGUAGE (FL)

FL 1001. Introduction to Foreign Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Introduction to a foreign language and culture, stressing progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of the culture being studied. Not open to native speakers of the language. FL 1001 is available in Arabic, Chinese, Hebrew, Portuguese and Swahili (see French, German, Italian, Japanese, Russian and Spanish below, listed alphabetically). See Foreign Language section appearing previously in the booklet for information about the Critical Languages Program course format.

FL 1002. Introduction to Foreign Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: One year of foreign language in high school or FL 1001 or the equivalent.** Introduction to foreign language and culture, part II, stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of the culture being studied. Not open to native speakers of the language.

FL 2001. Intermediate Foreign Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours).. **Prerequisite: FL 1002 or permission of instructor.** The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Not open to native speakers of foreign language.

FL 2002. Intermediate Foreign Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: FL 2001 or permission of instructor.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Not open to native speakers of the language.

FL 4490. Special Topics in Foreign Language. (1-3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: FL 2002 or permission of instructor.** Selected topics of interest to faculty and students.

FRENCH (FREN)

- See “Foreign Language Options” guidelines
- **IMPORTANT: Students are required to take the placement test offered in the Foreign Language Resource center before enrolling in 2001-2002 level courses directly from high school. This will ensure that you are not enrolling in a language course that is too difficult or too easy for you.**

FREN 1001. Introduction to French Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). Introduction to French language and culture, stressing progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of French and Francophone cultures. Not open to native speakers of French.

FREN 1002. Introduction to French Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: One year of high school French or FREN 1001 or the equivalent.** Introduction to French language and culture, "part II," stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of French and Francophone cultures. Not open to native speakers of French.

FREN 2001. Intermediate French Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Two years of high school French or the equivalent.** Builds upon acquisition of communication skills begun in high school. The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Activities related to a variety of disciplines will help to activate "real world" use of the language and knowledge of the culture. Students wishing to pursue study beyond this course will have the opportunity to earn a nationally recognized certification of proficiency in the language. Not open to native speakers of French.

FREN 2002. Intermediate French Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Three years of high school French or FREN 2001 or the equivalent.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Course will serve as a transition between intermediate and upper-level courses in French. Not open to native speakers of French.

GERMAN (GRMN)

- See “Foreign Language Options” guidelines
- **Please note: Students are required to take the placement test offered in the Foreign Language Resource center before enrolling in 2001-2002 level courses directly from high school. This will ensure that you are not enrolling in a language course that is too difficult or too easy for you.**

GRMN 1001. Introduction to German Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP. Introduction to the German language and culture, stressing progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of German culture. Not open to native speakers of German.

GRMN 1002. Introduction to German Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: One year of high school German, or GRMN 1001, or the equivalent.** Introduction to German language and culture, part II, stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of German culture. Not open to native speakers of German.

GRMN 2001. Intermediate German Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Two years of high school German, or GRMN 1002 or the equivalent.** Builds upon acquisition of communication skills begun in high school. The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Activities related to a variety of disciplines will help to activate "real world" use of the language and knowledge of the culture. Students wishing to pursue study beyond this course will have the opportunity to earn a nationally recognized certification of proficiency in the language. Not open to native speakers of German.

GRMN 2002. Intermediate German Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Three years of high school German or GRMN 2001 or the equivalent.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Course will serve as a transition between intermediate and upper-level courses in the language. Not open to native speakers of German.

HISTORY (HIST)

- **NOTE: Accel will not pay for history courses you have already completed in high school unless your counselor is willing to list them as a Social Studies elective on your Accel form.**

HIST 1110. Introduction To World Civilizations. (3 credit hours). An overview of world history which provides an introduction to the origin and development of the world's civilizations and their political, social, cultural, and economic traditions; uses a global approach to world history, and emphasizes the universal nature of the experience.

HIST 2112. America Since 1890. (3 credit hours). Examines the major themes of American history since 1890, the multicultural nature of contemporary U.S. civilization, and the nation's role in the global arena.

HIST 3305. The World Since 1945. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: HIST 1110. A survey of major themes in world history since 1945, it focuses on sociocultural and intellectual developments in addition to the traditional concerns with political and economic relations. Particular emphasis is given to great power relations, the role of the middle powers, North-South relations as well as the interactions between Western and non-Western cultures in the context of increasing globalization.

ITALIAN (ITAL)

- **See "Foreign Language Options" guidelines**

ITAL 1001. Introduction to Italian Culture and Language I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Introduction to Italian language and culture stressing progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Italian culture. Not open to native speakers of Italian.

ITAL 1002. Introduction to Italian Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: ITAL 1001 or permission of instructor. Introduction to Italian language and culture, part II, stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Italian culture. Not open to native speakers of Italian.

JAPANESE (JPN)

➤ See “Foreign Language Options” guidelines

JPN 1001. Introduction to Japanese Culture and Language I. (3 credit hours). Introduction to the Japanese language and culture stressing progressive acquisition of effective communications skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Japanese culture. Not open to native speakers of Japanese. See “Foreign Language Course Options” section that appears previously in this booklet for information about the Critical Languages Program course format.

JPN 1002. Introduction to Japanese Culture and Language II. 3-0-3. **Prerequisite: One year of high school Japanese, or JPN 1001, or the equivalent.** Introduction to Japanese language and culture, part II, stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Japanese culture. Not open to native speakers of Japanese.

JPN 2001. Intermediate Japanese Language and Culture I. 3-0-3. **Prerequisite: Two years of high school Japanese, or JPN 1002 or the equivalent.** The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Not open to native speakers of Japanese.

JPN 2002. Intermediate Japanese Culture and Language II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Three years of high school Japanese or JPN 2001 or the equivalent.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Not open to native speakers of Japanese.

MATHEMATICS (MATH)

➤ See “Mathematics Course Options” guidelines

MATH 1101. Mathematics Modeling. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. An applications-driven course that focuses on modeling real data concerning environmental issues. Incorporates collaborative learning, oral and written reports, and technology in the form of graphing calculator. Topics include linear, quadratic, piecewise defined, rational, polynomial, exponential and logarithmic functions.

MATH 1106. Elementary Applied Calculus. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: MATH 1101, or MATH 1113.** Uses techniques of college algebra and elementary calculus to analyze and model real world phenomena. The emphasis will be on applications using an intuitive approach to the mathematics rather than formal development. Topics include graphs, derivatives, and integrals of functions. The course incorporates collaborative learning, oral and written reports, and technology. MATH 1106 or MATH 1190 are required by many schools of business. Check with your school of choice if you intend to major in business.

MATH 1107. Elementary Statistics. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: MATH 1101 or MATH 1113.** Emphasizes techniques and applications rather than derivation. Topics include methods of summarizing data, probability, statistical inference and regression. The course incorporates collaborative learning, oral and written reports and technology.

MATH 1113. Precalculus. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Provides students with the foundation in elementary functions and understanding of mathematics needed to succeed in subsequent mathematics and science courses, especially calculus. Topics include polynomial, rational, exponential, logarithmic, and trigonometric functions. In each case, properties, graphs, and applications will

be presented. Technology, in the form of graphing calculators and/or computers, will be integrated throughout the course for instruction and study. Required for math/science majors.

- **NOTE: Honors sections of MATH 1113 offered during the FALL semester only.**

MATH 1190. Calculus I. (4 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Grade of “B” or better in MATH 1113.** A first course in calculus and analytic geometry. Topics include fundamental concepts of limits, continuity, derivatives, and integrals of functions of one variable. Incorporates applications from a variety of disciplines. Modern computing technology will be used where necessary and appropriate.

- **NOTE: Honors sections offered during the FALL semester only.**

MATH 2202. Calculus II. (4 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Grade of “B” or better in MATH 1190.** The main topics of this course will be integral calculus and infinite sequences and series. Emphasis will be placed on applications of the integral, techniques of integration, and Taylor Series. In addition to analytical methods, computing will be used to conduct numerical studies of integrals and series.

PHILOSOPHY (PHIL)

PHIL 2200. Ways of Knowing. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: None for JEHP students; ENGL 1101 recommended.** A philosophical, critical examination of the different ways of knowing and thinking in the humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences-including ethical and religious perspectives. Emphasis is on the nature and purpose of philosophical inquiry as applied to selected issues within philosophy and the broader implications of these methods and questions for other disciplines and in everyday contexts.

PHYSICS (PHYS)

- **IMPORTANT: Since the following courses require a STRONG background in precalculus, we recommend your taking them only if you have successfully completed Math 1113 at KSU or have completed and performed well in Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, and Analysis in high school. If the latter, notify the Honors Office that you will need to seek a pre-requisite waiver from KSU's Department of Biological and Physical Sciences.**

PHYS 1111. Introductory Physics I. (4 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Math 1113.** An introduction to classical mechanics, vibrations and waves, heat and kinetic theory. Topics include motion, force, statics, work, torque and rotational dynamics, oscillations, sound, temperature and heat transfer. The conservation laws of energy, momentum and angular momentum and their application to mechanical and thermal systems will be emphasized. Subject matter content will be reinforced through a systematic development of conceptual as well as quantitative problem solving skills. Laboratories will accompany these topics and concepts.

PHYS 1112. Introductory Physics II. (4 credit hours). **Prerequisite: PHYS 1111.** An introduction to classical electromagnetic theory, geometrical and physical optics and modern physics. Major topics include the concepts of the electric field and potential, circuits and their elements, magnetic fields, inductance, electromagnetic waves and their interaction with various media, interference and diffraction. Selected topics from atomic and nuclear physics as well as relativity will also be discussed. Subject matter content will be reinforced through conceptual as well as quantitative problem solving. Laboratories will accompany these topics and concepts.

POLITICAL SCIENCE & INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS (POLS)

- See “Social Science Options” guidelines

POLS 1101. American Government in a Global Perspective. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP. Examination of the institutions and processes of American government and Georgia State government. Global comparisons are made between the governments of the U.S. and other modern nation-states.

- **Honors sections offered during the FALL semester only.**

More advanced political science courses may be taken upon completion of POLS 1101.

PSYCHOLOGY (PSYC)

- See “Social Science Options” guidelines

PSYC 1101. General Psychology. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. The scientific approach to the study of psychological phenomena, human development, learning and thinking, motivation and emotion, perception, testing and measurement, personality and behavior.

PSYC 2258. Psychology of Adjustment. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. The dynamics of normal and maladaptive adjustment, including the study of appropriate and inappropriate reactions to frustration and stress; resolution of conflicts, fears and anxiety; building emotional stability and preventing mental illness.

More advanced psychology courses are available upon completion of PSCY 1101.

RUSSIAN (RUSS)

- See “Foreign Language Options” guidelines for description of Critical Languages Program course format.

RUSS 1001. Introduction to Russian Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. Introduction to the Russian language and culture, stressing progressive acquisition of effective communications skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of the culture being studied. Not open to native speakers of Russian.

RUSS 1002. Introduction to Russian Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: RUSS 1001.** Introduction to Russian language and culture, part II, stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Russian culture. Not open to native speakers of Russian.

RUSS 2001. Intermediate Russian Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: RUSS 1002.** Builds upon acquisition of communication skills begun in high school. The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Not open to native speakers of Russian.

RUSS 2002. Intermediate Russian Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: RUSS 2001.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Not open to native speakers of Russian.

SCIENCE (SCI)

- See “Science Options” guidelines
- JEHP students planning to major in the Sciences should not take the SCI 1101-1102 sequence.

SCI 1101. Interdisciplinary Science: Basic Principles. (4 credit hours). Prerequisite: NONE for JEHP students. This course is the first in a two-part sequence that fulfills the general education science requirement. Using the context of environmental issues, it introduces students to the basic nature of matter, energy, and living systems and to the nature of science. Emphasis is placed on making decisions about scientific issues. Science 1101 is not designed for science majors and is not a prerequisite for introductory courses in biology, chemistry, or physics.

SCI 1102. Interdisciplinary Science: Issues in Science. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: SCI 1101 or its equivalent.** This course is the second in a two-part sequence that fulfills the general education science requirement. Using the context of environmental issues, it introduces students to the basic skills and scientific understandings needed by educated citizens to make informed decisions about scientific issues.

SOCIOLOGY (SOCI)

- See “Social Science Options” guidelines

SOCI 2000. Introduction to Gender Studies (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: ENGL 1101 with C or better. This course examines the ways that women’s and men’s gender roles are shaped by social interaction. Using materials and learning approaches from multiple disciplines, students will explore questions about how individual and group expectations about gender behavior are created and sustained.

SOCI 2201. Principles of Sociology. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP students. An overview of sociology which emphasizes the social nature of human behavior, including an introduction to culture, social structure, socialization, deviance, stratification, family, gender, religion, demography, and complex organization.

More advanced Sociology courses are available to students who have completed SOCI 2201.

SPANISH (SPAN)

- See “Foreign Language Options” guidelines
- **Students are required to take the placement test offered in the Foreign Language Resource center before enrolling in 2001-2002 level courses. This will ensure that you are not enrolling in a language course that is too difficult or too easy for you.**

SPAN 1001. Introduction To Spanish Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None for JEHP. Introduction to Spanish language and culture, stressing progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Hispanic cultures. Not open to native speakers of Spanish.

SPAN 1002. Introduction to Spanish Language and Culture II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: One year of high school Spanish OR Spanish 1001 OR the equivalent.** Introduction to Spanish language and culture, "part II," stressing continued, progressive acquisition of effective communication skills in both the written and spoken language and an understanding of the practices and products of Hispanic cultures. Not open to native speakers of Spanish.

SPAN 2001. Intermediate Spanish Language and Culture I. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Two Years of high school Spanish or SPAN 1002 or the equivalent.** The student will continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, and learn to communicate in culturally appropriate ways. Not open to native speakers of Spanish.

SPAN 2002. Intermediate Spanish II. (3 credit hours). **Prerequisite: Three Years of High School Spanish or SPAN 2001 or the equivalent.** Students continue to increase linguistic and cultural proficiency through the use of a variety of materials and activities. Course will serve as a transition between intermediate and upper-level courses in Spanish. Not open to native speakers of Spanish.

SPAN 2030. Spanish for Public and Social Services and Criminal Justice. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None. This course focuses on Spanish language and culture appropriate for working in the fields of Public and Social Services and Criminal Justice with Hispanics.

SPAN 2032. Spanish for Health Professionals. (3 credit hours). Prerequisite: None. This course focuses on Spanish language and culture appropriate for working with Hispanics in the medical field.

OVERVIEW: ACCEL FUNDING AT KSU

The Accel Program of the HOPE Scholarship Fund

The Accel Program is for high school juniors and seniors at accredited public or private high schools in the state of Georgia, and is operated in all school terms except summer. **Accel will pay a JEHP student's tuition and most fees and provide a book allowance from HOPE Scholarship funds for approved courses.** The Accel program is overseen by the Georgia Student Finance Commission, which publishes a directory of Accel-approved courses on its website, www.gsfc.org. This directory is reproduced in the back of this booklet. Accel only pays for courses in the areas of the core graduation requirements for college preparatory students: English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and Foreign Language.

Out-of-Pocket Costs for Students

- **Mandatory fees:** In addition to paying for JEHP students' tuition, Accel will pay students' mandatory fees up to a state cap of \$283. In Spring semester 2009, because KSU's fees exceeded this cap, students were responsible for paying \$291 in fees, plus any lab fees (typically \$25-\$40) associated with their classes. Be aware that these mandatory fees are the same whether a student is taking one class or five classes, so students do not reduce their mandatory fees by taking fewer classes. Fees for 2009-10 will not be known until after the state legislature approves the state budget in the spring of each year. JEHP students have been exempted from two new fees that will apply to regular entering freshmen beginning in Fall 2009: they will not have to pay a mandatory meal plan fee or an athletic field fee if they are living off-campus. JEHP students may choose to purchase a meal plan, but it is not required. Students may opt to apply their Accel book funds to their fee balance.
- **Lab fees:** If students take a course with lab fees, they are responsible for paying these lab fees.
- **Textbook costs:** Accel provides a book allowance based on the number of courses a student takes. This allowance is credited, depending on your preference, to a KSU debit card, the Higher One card, or to your checking account, or mailed to you as a paper check. Or, if you prefer, your textbook funds may be applied to your mandatory fee balance noted above. The current Accel textbook allowance is \$150 per semester for students enrolled in 6 or more credit hours; and \$75 for students taking less than 6 credit hours. Depending on the textbooks required by particular classes, the cost of textbooks may exceed the Accel allowance. In these cases, students are responsible for paying the balance owed. We encourage JEHP students to purchase books early while used books, which are substantially discounted, are still available in the bookstore, or to search online sources for used editions of their books.

Tuition and Fees for non-Accel Courses

Students may elect to take KSU courses that are not on the Accel-approved list. Students are responsible for tuition and fees for these courses.

Parking permits

Parking permits are included in the student fees covered by Accel. We encourage students from the same high school to carpool together if their schedules permit. Drivers with carpool permits may park in specially designated spaces that are closer to main campus buildings than regular lots.

HOPE credits

The HOPE Scholarship will pay for up to 127 credits hours of college coursework. The credit hours that are paid for by Accel to Joint Enrollment Students are subtracted from your total HOPE credits.

Evaluation for continued HOPE Eligibility at 30 credit hours

HOPE/Accel recipients must have a cumulative 3.0 GPA in college coursework at the 30 hour checkpoint to be eligible to renew their HOPE scholarships. Students who do not earn 30 credits in JEHP will not be evaluated for continuing HOPE eligibility until they have completed 30 credit hours. Although you are receiving Accel funds, JEHP students must still complete the e-HOPE application available from gacollege411.org to receive HOPE funding after high school graduation. We encourage you to complete the e-HOPE application and a FAFSA application for other sources of financial aid by January of your senior year in high school.

ACCEL FORM INSTRUCTIONS

Each of the six steps outlined below is essential to (a) your receiving dual credit for KSU courses that meet your high school graduation requirements and (b) Accel's paying for these dual-credit courses.

1. At your KSU advising session, you will receive an Accel Application Form. Your advisor will help complete Part II of the form with the courses and course codes for the classes you'd like to take.
2. Read the application instructions and, with a parent or guardian, fill out Part I with all the information requested. **Be sure your parent or guardian signs Part I of the form.**
3. Take the application to your high school counselor and ask him or her to approve Part II, which lists the courses you would like to take at KSU. **Your counselor must sign Part II of the form AND emboss it with your school's seal.** If your counselor would like to make changes in the courses you take, he or she should draw a line through the course that should be changed and write in alternative course(s).

4. Make a copy of your Accel application for your own records, and **return the original copy of your Accel application to the Honors Office on the 4th floor of the Library by the deadline noted on your advising mailing.** Accel forms may not be faxed, because the high school's embossed seals will not be legible. You will not be permitted to register for classes unless we have received your Accel form.

You will need to complete a new Accel application each semester you are enrolled at KSU.
