## Beginning of a Legacy



Band ("The Marching Owls"), which had its debut
performance in the Fall of 2015. She was also
responsible for the KSU Basketball Pep Band and
served as the Conductor of the KSU Wind
Symphony. She taught beginning instrumental
conducting, wind band literature, arranging and
pedagogy, and marching band technique courses,
while also advising Music Education students. She
also served as the Kappa Kappa Psi (Nu Mu) and
Tau Beta Sigma (lota Psi) chapter advisor.

## **CORY MEALS**

#### Assistant Director of Bands

Dr. Cory Meals served as the Assistant Director of Bands and Assistant Professor of Instrumental Music Education at Kennesaw State University from 2015-2016. His duties included teaching courses in Instrumental Methods, Music Education Colloquium, Wind Band Literature, supervision of student teachers, conducting the University Band, and assisting with all aspects of the Kennesaw State University Athletic Bands, including the newly formed Kennesaw State University Marching Owls and KSU Basketball Pep Band.

## The Inaugural Year

"The Marching Owls" inaugural season occurred in the Fall of 2015! The ensemble consisted of members from a plethora of majors from both the Marietta and Kennesaw campuses. At its inception, the band garnered the interest of about 500 students! After auditions were held the inaugural band was a total of 237 members.

Member uniforms have a black base, and black and gold plumes are used. the drum major uniform, is white, with a white shako and plume.





The goal was to foster a sense of community, pride, and service among Kennesaw State's band students while also supporting the university's band programs. Through her mentorship, both chapters quickly became an integral part of the KSU band program, helping to instill leadership, promote musical excellence, and strengthen the bonds of friendship among student musicians.

## Tau Beta Sigma






## Genr Two




## 2017


#### Marching Owls in the Limelight

#### Band on the Road

The band had its first travel game this year at Jacksonville State University in Alabama. Only a portion of the band was sent to support the team, but their presence was powerful and resulted in a KSU win 17-7!

The band also performed their sci-fi themed show featuring pieces such as "Star Trek Generations" and "New Divide" in exhibition at Lassiter High School on October 26, 2017. The band was originally scheduled to play at Cobb Exhibition this year, but due to weather the performance was cancelled.





## 2018 Year Four

The Marching Owls had many featured performances during 2018. These included the first-ever football game played in Suntrust Park (now Truist Park) against JSU, with a record 5-over-time win, an away game performance at Georgia State, and an appearance at the Cobb County Exhibition! The Marching Owls are on the rise and are becoming a recognizable name in Georgia.






























### 2020


The pandemic made music difficult for everyone around the country, but that didn't stop the Marching Owls from marching on. Dr. Traficante and Dr. Schievert elected to participate in "Together As One - One Nation," a fully arranged, designed, and choreographed marching band performance, available free of charge to any school or band director promoted by the Varsity Performing Arts. Bands across the country performed this show as a message that together we could get through the pandemic.

As this season had no football games to perform at, the staff decided to record stands tunes and half-time shows and upload them to YouTube to share. This was the first experience in college band for many freshmen, so these small opportunities to perform were treasured. The new drum major, Barron Wallace, also led the band in a taped pre-game performance. There were also a few public performances on the Campus Green to share music with the community.

The KSU War Chant was written by Dr. Traficante for the KSU Basketball Band in 2014. The Basketball Band was later named "The HOO!" after Dr. Harris joined the staff in 2017. Most of The Hoo's performers were also members of the Marching Owls, however, the music performed in each ensemble was slightly different. A few members suggested to Dr. T that the War Chant would be a great addition to add energy at football games and it was subsequently added to the football game stand tunes. It's hard to believe that only a few years ago not many people on campus knew the war chant, but it's now almost as popular as the Fight Song!













# Marching Owls Traditions & Changes

### Owl Walk

Before every game, the band will play certain tunes to welcome the arriving home team. Did you know:

- The entire band used to march to the stadium for Owl Walk
- For some years, there was a rotation of small groups that would walk to the stadium entrance instead of the full band
- As of 2021, the full band plays by the Nest

### Senior Show

Each year, the band seniors vote on the final show of the season (typically a repeat of a previous show)

## Auld Lang Syne

This is considered the band song that is performed in the stadium after the Alma Mater after each game

 This song includes a trumpet solo that would rotate each game between people who auditioned

## Drum Major Selections

This process has evolved over the years. Initially, it included mace twirling, interviews, marching auditions, and a written essay. Each year the drum major was voted on by the band.

The band had its first overnight travel to East Tennessee State University. The team lost, but the band had a great time and the alumni were waiting at Bandsmart to welcome them back!







As the band enters a second year with its new leadership, it is the largest the band program has ever been! With about 300 members, the band brings a presence like never before.






The band performed at another Exhibition this year - the Sprayberry Southern Invitational on October 21st. 2023!

## AULD LANG

Syre

"Auld Lang Syne" is a Scottish folk song traditionally sung to bid farewell to the old year on New Year's Eve. The phrase "auld lang syne" roughly translates to "days gone by" or "times long past." The song reflects themes of nostalgia, friendship, and the passing of time. In the lyrics, the singer asks if old times should be forgotten, only to answer that they should not be, and that they should always be remembered and cherished. To the Marching Owls, this song speaks to the idea of honoring past memories and moments, despite the passage of time. It is often used to commemorate the ending of the season and honor graduating members.







### Rehearse, Rehearse!


