Al Integration Tiers

Al is only used in the ideation process to generate imagery that will then be used by the human artist to create a working sketch from which the final composition will be derived. The human artist generates the final image in its entirety.

Al is only used in the ideation process to generate the thumbnail sketches that will then be used by the human artist as the basis for a final composition. The human artist generates the final image in its entirety.

Al is used in both the ideation process and to generate a work which the human artist will subsequently make significant additions and/or changes to complete the work.

Al is used in both the ideation process and to generate the final work. The human artist's input is limited to prompt engineering.

Al is used for the entire process, including Al generation of the text prompt and creating the image with no human input other than coding needed to create the initial program. An example of this would be an autonomous Al which scans the internet for trending topics, analyzes and generates prompts based on those topics, and proceeds to generate imagery, constantly searching for new trends and updating itself, learning and training as it goes.
