<b>HON 2400/01 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: Changing the World: The United Nations Agenda for Sustainable Development</b>	12364	Jesús Castro-Balbi	M: 12:30pm–2:30pm (Kennesaw) (7-week I)
The United Nations has set an Agenda for Sustainable Development and related Sustainable Development Goals to advance people, planet and prosperity. Through this team-based experience, students will explore complex global issues, current strategies and initiatives, and opportunities for leadership and impact as engaged citizens.				
<b>HON 2400/02 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: Money for Change: Federal Funding Priorities</b>	12367	Jesús Castro-Balbi	W: 12:30pm–2:30pm (Kennesaw) (7-week I)
Federal agencies have identified and prioritized issues and initiatives for funding. Students will explore the landscape of federal grant funding through these priorities. Students will then reflect on the opportunities for engagement and societal impact, including related to their major field of study.				
<b>HON 2400/03 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: African American Studies</b>	15951	Keir Singleton-Ortiz	W: 12:30pm–2:30pm (Kennesaw) (7-week I)
This course is a survey of important literary works and social movements within African American studies. The course will explore the journey of African American people in the U.S. and consider the ways in which they shaped and challenged public discussion about race, ethnicity, religion, class, citizenship status, gender, economics, and patriotism. We will specifically focus on literary works and lived experiences from 19th-20th centuries. Students will read and analyze a variety of literary forms and visit local monuments and museums within the greater Atlanta area to support class discussions and assignments.				

<b>HON 2400/04 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: More Than Just a Game: Sport and American Society</b>	16667	Catherine Lewis	T: 2:00pm– 4:00pm (Kennesaw) (7- week I)
Sports unite people, teach values, and inspire hope. Sports have powerful efforts to bring people from diverse backgrounds together, shape them, and project a vision of what it means to be American. This Honors Discovery class examines how and why we engage in sport – as participants, fans, parents, or coaches – and how it shapes our social lives, the economy, culture, and politics. In this 5-week course, we will look at the business of sports, the power of sports on film, fan culture, sporting scandals and controversies, and how sports impact virtually every aspect of society.				
<b>HON 2400/05 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: Food, Culture, and Society</b>	16672	Katy Matello	TH: 2:00pm– 4:00pm (Kennesaw) (7- week I)
Food touches nearly every aspect of our lives and is one of the most important symbolic aspects of our everyday lives. In this course we explore foodways, or food within a social and cultural context. This course provides students with an overview of food as a cultural, historical, and societal marker. Topics addressed may include food and memory, food as a weapon of war, and food in a global world.				
<b>HON 2400/06 (0 credit hours)</b>	<b>Honors Discovery: Futurism: Designing the Future with Strategic Foresight</b>	16759	Anissa Vega	F: 12:30–2:30pm (Marietta) (7- week II)
This course introduces students to the practice of strategic foresight. While humans cannot reliably predict the future, we can use data and creativity protocols like strategic foresight to generate a collection of possible futures. By generating possible futures, leaders can plan actions that move their organization toward the most desirable future and steer clear of dystopian fears. In this class, learners will work together to generate several possible futures, analyze those futures, plan action steps, and design a collection of artifacts that illustrate a provocative, inspiring, or desired future. This class will draw upon signals and drivers of the future like artificial intelligence, robotics, climate change, organ regeneration, and quantum computing to imagine the future of a chosen field of study.

Intended for students of any discipline, this course will introduce fundamental principles, concepts, considerations, practices, and processes related to sustainability. Students will learn to recognize and analyze the value of interdisciplinary collaboration in developing design decisions that support sustainable solutions. The course will introduce useful resources and methods for researching environmental issues across a variety of disciplines. Students will grow as critical, proactive thinkers able to understand and manage their impact on their environment. <b>This course will meet once per week for 10 weeks throughout the semester.</b>

Acute stress can have protective properties while chronic stress can have detrimental effects on our health. This course will explore the physiological response to real and perceived stress to understand the mechanisms underlying these responses. Students will examine interdisciplinary research associated with psychoneuroimmunology (PNI) and explore recent advances in science that have contributed to the knowledge of how the mind can be used as a potent force in modifying the biological mechanisms involved in wellness and illness. Topics include the mind/body interaction, its effects on overall health through modulation of the immune system, and mind/body interventions.
