Dr. Judy Allen has been teaching at Kennesaw State University for over 19 years. In that time, she has made quite an impact on her students. Showing Students the Lay of the Land

Professor Matt Wilson teaches Geospatial Sciences in the Department of Geography and Anthropology and is a registered land surveyor in the state of Georgia. His passion for teaching the capstone course SURV 4475 Land Surveying Practice ignites the enthusiasm of his students and provides them the opportunity to engage in experiential learning that fuels career success. The course places students in the field completing actual surveys for non-profits or low-income individuals, thus providing critical services to the community. These experiences remove students from a silo mentality and enables them to incorporate all their skills working with team members in a challenging physical environment. Students are also able to take relevant classes that build marketable skills in aerial photography and piloting drones, which provides value in GIS environments. The department offers one of only three land surveying certificates available in the state and has the longest running curriculum in this field of expertise.
