#### LeeAnn Lands

This past October, LeeAnn won The Georgia Historical Records Advisory Council's Award for Excellence in Archival Research for her book, *Poor Atlanta: Poverty, Race, and the Limits of Sunbelt Development.* 

#### Jennifer Dickey

On November 3rd , the Georgia National Register Review Board unanimously approved the Lemon Street School National Register nomination that was prepared, in part, by students in Dickey's Documentation & Interpretation class in the spring of 2022. The building served as a school for African-American children from 1951-1971, and was deemed eligible for the National Register which is the "nation's official list of historic places worthy of preservation."

#### Marianne Holdzkom

On October 30th , Marianne was the keynote speaker for the Presidential Wreath Laying in honor of John Adams's 288th birthday.
