### David Parker

David's article "From Oglethorpe to the Lost Cause: The Early History of Georgia Day" was published in the Journal of the Georgia Association of Historians.

Parker also wrote a guest op/ed, titled "No One Needs to Read More Than Three Books" (a brief look at book banning in Georgia history), for the *Marietta Daily Journal*.

#### Chris Gleason

Over the last few months, Chris has been featured in <u>Vox</u>, <u>Bay Area</u> and <u>Salt Lake City public radio</u>, <u>The Canadian</u> <u>National Post</u>, and <u>Volkskrant</u> in the Netherlands.

Gleason's book, *American Poly*, won the "2024 Award for Research in Relationship Diversity" from the Kinsey Institute, and was invited to Indiana University to give a lecture the first week in April.

### Jennifer Dickey

On February 23, 2024, the National Park Service added the Lemon Street School to the National Register of Historic Places. Students in Dr. Jennifer Dickey's HIST 4426, Documentation & Interpretation course, with support from Marietta City Schools and MARB Special Projects staff, prepared the National Register nomination for the school in Spring 2022.

The Lemon Street grammar school opened in 1951 and closed in 1970. The school served all Black students in Cobb County until the district integrated in 1965. It was briefly used as a junior high school, and later served as the home of the Hattie G. Wilson Library until the county shut it down in January 2013. Marietta City Schools committed to a massive project in 2019 to renovate the site that now houses non- traditional academic programs for middle and high school students.
