Building on KSU's successful Year of Peru, Ernesto Silva and Dan Paracka--working closely with the Consul General of Peru, Miguel Alemán Urteaga, as well as Christian Hardigree of The School of Culinary Sustainability and Hospitality, and Jenifer Duggan of Culinary and Hospitality Services--served as hosts for a week-long Culinary Residency by celebrated Peruvian Master Chef Flavio Solórzano during the week of November 2, 2015. One of the most recognized and celebrated chefs of Peru, Flavio Solórzano's specialty is Peruvian cuisine, including pastry and ice cream--he is credited with the creation of coca leaf Ice Cream. He has done extensive research on quinoa and his repertoire of quinoa dishes made from the 3,000 varieties of the grain cultivated in the Andes Mountains can be found in his 2013 book *Ayara: Madre Quinoa,* in which he hails the grain's virtues. He is a founding member of ACOA (Peruvian Society of Gastronomy) and the annual MISTURA festival, one of the largest food festivals in the world, as well as the host of a popular cooking show on Peruvian television. During his residency, he visited numerous classes, conducted cooking demonstrations and hosted a Quinoa Tasting Festival at the Commons that was well-attended by students.

ISD affiliated faculty, Dr. Linda Niemann, says: "Participants will spend four weeks in the historic and artistic colonial city of Oaxaca, located in the south of Mexico. Oaxaca is known for beautiful colonial architecture, bright artwork and a tranquil atmosphere. Students will live with host families and take Spanish courses at the instituto Cultural and creative writing courses taught in English by the KSU program director. The program will include fieldtrips to woodcarving, pottery, and weaving villages, as well as a three-day excursion to the coastal town of Huatulco enroute to which we will visit the culturally important shrine to the Virgin of Juquila. Oaxaca is the art center of Mexico, has a perfect warm climate, and is minutes from the fascinating archeological site of Monte Alban. The town is surrounded by traditional Zapotec, Mixtec, and Mixe villages, some of which have codices and local museums. Immersion in the culture and guided fieldtrips, combined with language instruction, will give students an intensive experience of Mexican life."
